elf-Expression
Analysand & Analyst

"In doing analysis I aim at being myself and behaving myself," Winnicott wrote. But how do we manage as psychoanalysts to be ourselves while doing analysis? Does analytic neutrality overlap with naturalness? How does the psychoanalyst express him/herself in the work? Is the analyst's choice of technique a form of self-expression or should we think of analytic technique as trying to get yourself out of the way so the analysand can express him/herself? And what is self-expression for the analysand in the analytic situation?

The question of self-expression allows us to look at the analytic exchange from some novel perspectives. This conference invites consideration of self-expression in both analysand and analyst as a way of exploring how clinicians of diverse views are thinking about their most challenging work.

Panels and papers will explore such topics as the effect of the analyst's emotional presence (or absence), and the effects of various sorts of self-disclosures: deliberate, inadvertent and unavoidable. What if a patient recognizes an analyst's pain? Is humor self-disclosure? Another paper takes up what happens when psychotic patients' efforts at speaking about themselves are missed. And a critique is offered of the current cultural devaluation of privacy and over-valuation of self-expression. Two panels will use clinical material to examine how analyst/analysand differences in class, race or sexual orientation may be limiting factors on self-expression. Two other special panels will consider Winnicott's own self-expression, and reconsider the painful dilemmas and consequences of Freud's analysis of his daughter.
