Love is the province of many human studies, literature, history, and the arts, and does not belong to psychology alone. Yet it seems to lie at the heart of psychoanalysis. Psychoanalysis has a unique contribution to make towards understanding the human capacity for love. The investigation of how and why we connect with others, the evolution of loving relationships through the developmental cycle, and how this capacity can be distorted are central concerns of psychoanalysis. As a counterpoint to the current emphasis on narcissism, this conference offers a renewed emphasis on love and loving.
