SEMINARS IN THE DIVISION OF CONTINUING EDUCATION

Child and Adolescent Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy

An introduction to analytic work with children and adolescents examining transference, defenses, and developmental issues. Clinical material will be used in exploring questions of technique, the use of play, fantasy, and family sessions.
